DEPOT DEPUT DELIGHTS JULEBYEN FESTIVAL-GOERS!

The hard work put in by depot volunteer rebuilders paid off handsomely with the many complements heard from those who saw the restored depot for the first time over Julebyen weekend.

Hats off to volunteer general contractor, Larry Ronning, who installed one of the remaining windows the day before Julebyen in harmony with all those buzzing around decorating the depot and setting up displays.

The depot seemed to know it was the debutant of the ball by providing shelter, heat and light and great photo opps with holiday lighting, fresh snow, trains, characters from Norwegian mythology and many, many happy children.

A total of 282 rode the Julebyen Express from Duluth over the weekend – a more than 25% increase over last year – and we hope part of the reason was to see the restored depot. Five Troll Trains to Troll Canyon (Sucker River gorge) carried 827, mostly young families, in search of trolls. And they did see them!

The Troll Train is only made possible through the generosity of the North Shore Scenic Railroad, which does not charge Julebyen for the four hours their locomotive is in KR and available to Julebyen. Julebyen keeps the revenue from Troll Train tickets and the NSSR from the Duluth round trip Express ticket sales.

Note: Revenue from the Troll Train helps keep Julebyen, a non-profit, free to the public. Julebyen neither has nor seeks a commercial sponsor, but rather relies on more than 200 volunteers to bring this family-centered Christmas celebration to thousands across the upper Midwest.

Inside the depot on the east half were hundreds of "Vintage Christmas Treasures" consisting of vintage tree and home decorations. The remainder of the depot was devoted to ticket sales and providing children with clues for numerous treasure hunts that took place on KRHCC grounds.

Our normally reserved "Historical Artifact Czar," Todd Lindahl, displayed some railroad memorabilia in the bump-out and found himself the center of attention for all who wanted to know more about the depot and North Shore railroad history. Todd even wore a festive red shirt!

DEPOT TEAMS WITH JULEBYEN FOR GREAT MEDIA COVERAGE
